National Human Trafficking Prevention Month

January was declared "National Human Trafficking Prevention Month" in 2010 by former President Barack Obama via a presidential proclamation. Fifteen years prior to this proclamation, the [Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 \(TVPA\)](#) preserved the United States' dedication to combating human trafficking.

Since the presidential proclamation and the enshrinement of TVPA, there have been significant U.S anti-trafficking policy achievements. For example, the [Trafficking Survivors Relief Act \(TRSA\)](#) unanimously passed through the U.S. House of Representatives in December, 2025. TRSA would provide an avenue for criminalized survivors of human trafficking to clear their federal criminal records, marking a historic step forward in protecting survivors of trafficking at the federal level.

[Youth With Disabilities and Human Trafficking \(Educational Brief\)](#)

"Youth With Disabilities and Human Trafficking" is a six-page educational brief that highlights the multiple factors that contribute to the elevated prevalence of intimate partner violence (IPV), human trafficking (HT), and exploitation (E) among youth with disabilities as well as how exposure to such violence impacts their health.

The brief offers recommendations for health centers ensuring that people with disabilities have access to and can receive relevant support and services. The brief covers HRSA's UDS measures on HT/E related to adolescents, the corresponding ICD-10 documentation codes, and key resources and guidance to facilitate clinician/patient engagement.

Developed by NTAP's, HITEQ and Health Partners on IPV +Exploitation, this four-page practical guide features key tools and principles to help health centers (HCs) develop safe documentation for intimate partner violence, human trafficking, and exploitation (IPV/HT/E) in their electronic health records (EHRs) and other technology tools.

The guide also features tools that FUTURES has developed alongside health IT platforms, namely for eClinicalWorks and OCHIN Epic, to aid HCs in using the evidence-based CUES intervention that focuses on universal education approaches to IPV/HT/E.

Public Health Report: Intimate Partner Violence and Human Trafficking Screening and Services in Primary Care Across Underserved Communities in the United States - Initial Examination of Trends, 2020 - 2021

Health Partners on IPV +Exploitation Director, [Anna Marjavi](#), and [Kimberly S.G. Chang, MD, MPH](#), Family Physician, Human Trafficking and Healthcare Policy Director at Asian Health Services, and consultant of Health Partners on IPV +Exploitation, contributed to authoring a public health report with Sue C Lin, Katherine Y Chon, Melissa E Dichter, and Jessica DuBois Palardy titled, "[Intimate Partner Violence and Human Trafficking Screening and Services in Primary Care Across Underserved Communities in the United States—Initial Examination of Trends, 2020-2021](#)".

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) began collecting data on intimate partner violence (IPV) and human trafficking (HT) in the 2020 Uniform Data System (UDS). We examined patients affected by IPV and HT served by HRSA-funded health centers in medically underserved US communities during the pandemic.

Upcoming Conference Presentation: 2026 SAHM Annual Meeting

Join [Health Partners on IPV +Exploitation](#), and [School-Based Health Alliance](#) for a session titled, “**Adolescent Relationship Abuse and Human Trafficking: Collaborating Across Systems for Prevention and Intervention**” at the [2026 Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine Annual Meeting](#) from March 3, 2026 - March 5, 2026 at the Westin Seattle in Seattle, Washington.

Health Partners on Intimate Partner Violence + Exploitation and the School-Based Health Alliance, partnered to train school-based healthcare (SBHC) providers and staff on strategies for addressing ARA among their patients. This intervention was informed by a previous study in SBHCs that found that patients who received brief universal education and harm reduction counseling about ARA were more likely to recognize sexual coercion, had increased knowledge of relationship abuse resources, and had increased self-efficacy to use harm reduction behaviors.

In this workshop, presenters from Health Partners on IPV +Exploitation and SBHA support participants in creating a plan to address ARA and HT in their setting. In addition to sharing clinical approaches to offering universal education and support related to relationship abuse, presenters will discuss strategies participants can use to collaborate across systems.
